The Donor Partnership: More Ways to Give

As our partners in the Work of the Spirit, you have given to Nazareth Home and Sojourner Truth House in many different ways. To be sure, every gift, whether it is time, talent or treasure, is deeply valued by each of us who works for or in these ministries. As volunteers, you have given thousands of hours of service translating into several full-time equivalent personnel, which has an enormous impact on the bottom line for each ministry. Some of you share your talents with our ministries, such as cooking, building or repairing items, helping to maintain facilities, etc. Others choose to share their treasure with our ministries. Whatever form your gift has taken is a welcomed treasure to us. In that spirit, I want to share a few methods of gift-giving that may enhance charitable contributions.

1. Donate directly to the ministry of your choice (Nazareth Home and/or Sojourner Truth House)
 - Donate online (see Online Donation Instructions on back page);
 - Donate via mail: mail your contribution directly to the ministry of your choice;
 - Donate via phone: Call 219-947-8542;
2. Employer Matching Gifts. Many employers will match their employees' gifts to charitable organizations. These may include current employees, retirees, board members, etc. Contact the Human Resources office at your workplace for more information.
3. Donate through a United Way campaign. Although neither Sojourner Truth House, nor Nazareth Home are United Way agencies, you may designate these ministries to receive your contribution. When asked to "Designate a LAUW organization", choose "Other." In the space provided, designate the ministry of your choice (i.e. Nazareth Home or Sojourner Truth House) to receive your contribution.
4. Designate a ministry in your Will or Estate Plan.

Reflection

The Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ and the Congregation of St. Agnes (my community) share the value of Community. Jesus and Martin Luther King, Jr. spoke of the Reign of God, the "Beloved Community." What is this notion of community?

I resist defining things like Community. I can only describe some characteristics of healthy community—whether in the home, the convent, the church congregation, the neighborhood, a city, state, nation, group of nations or the global community. And I hesitate to do so since community is so wondrously complex and beautifully organic. But I plunge in because I believe deeply that community and its healthy holistic living is what the world hungers for. It is what is being forged here at Sojourner Truth House (STH) and what needs to be more intentionally built. I think it is the infrastructure of humanity, really of all creation, though consciously of humanity. While we here at STH do not construct buildings or roads or sidewalks or sewer lines—the physical infrastructure of a community—I think we attempt to help build what I might call the "psychic/spiritual infrastructure" that makes for real community.

How? Well, from the moment a homeless client and her children walk through our doors, they are treated with respect. They are welcomed, their fears are addressed, their need for some kind of structure is met with our schedule and expectations of them. They are listened to with reverence (sometimes with downright awe) and encouraged to stay with the program. Their physical needs are met with clothing, nutritious meals and snacks, personal hygiene items and an assessment regarding their medical concerns. We surround them with the comfort and the challenge of human community hopefully at its best.

We staff, volunteers, new board members and Ancilla Systems Incorporated co-workers represent the marvelous diversity of the human species and are committed to the mission of STH. We create community among ourselves, so that we can then do so with our clients. When I look at the classes and counseling sessions we offer, the efforts we make to know peoples' names and stories, I see us building a community. When I see us challenging a client or an agency toward their best selves, that is what a healthy community does within itself. When a woman begins the painful climb out of addiction or mental illness with our support, community heals itself. When people, like yourselves, step up to the plate and donate or come to volunteer, I see those in the community who have a little more, helping those with less, make a way. When all of us work to save the environment, speak up for universal health care, insist on civil rights for all our brothers and sisters, community is sparked. When we work through our issues with one another, we strengthen the foundation of—you guessed it—community. When we work at speaking and acting nonviolently, inclusively and mutually, we create a community whose power is "power with" rather than "power over." These communitarian values of acceptance, reconciliation, mutuality, reverent listening, comfort, challenge, courage, honesty, doing our own personal work and creating the space for others to do theirs without judgment—among many others—can be detected readily at STH. As we become more intentional in this striving, I realize we are building the "psychic/spiritual infrastructure" for the community of Gary and beyond. We dream of sharing this awareness and these learnings with the wider community. Partner with us in doing so. The world is starved for true, strong community. Let us not disappoint

Being a volunteer at Sojourner Truth House has been a growth experience for me. People we see live with greater faith than I have been required to exercise in my life. Ninety-nine percent of them respond to a greeting of "How are you today?" with a smile and an "I'm Blessed."

We work with the community-based clients who come to obtain food, personal care items, and clothing. Believe me, they give me much more than I give them. How

my heart melted when one lady presented me with a pen she wanted me to have. A gentleman walked to Sojourner Truth House—on crutches—just to thank me for the new crutch tips I had procured for him.

We interview each one, trying to determine if there are

other resources to which we can direct them. One of my fellow volunteers was able to motivate a gentleman who could not read to attend literacy classes. We all rejoiced with him when he accomplished his goal.

Another client was able to obtain a job. We nearly danced! Others are receiving an extra \$96.40 in their small social security checks after we identified their eligibility for state payment of their Medicare premium. Through the efforts of Sojourner Truth House, many now have health care and medication who could not afford it previously.

Although our volunteers come from different towns and vocational backgrounds, we all share a philosophy of caring, and a commitment to treat all with dignity. We work as advocates to connect these clients with the resources they need to improve the quality of their lives. These efforts have led to relationships that include sharing their triumphs, joys, and sorrows, and sometimes we just have fun together.

More than one hundred former foster children, adoptive families, staff, friends, and volunteers gathered on Saturday August 1st at Riley Park in East Chicago for the 4th Annual Reunion of Nazareth Home children and their families. 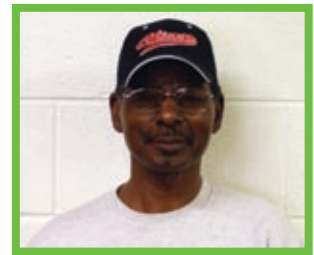

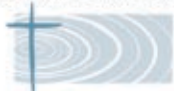
